# Fund. Curate. Engage Ensuring funding for visual arts literacy programs in perpetuity

As we reflect on the previous year, I feel it is extremely important to acknowledge the outstanding work provided to the Smith Foundation by the Executive Director, Meredith Preuss, the members of the Board of Directors, all those who worked in various capacities, and, especially, the many volunteers and committee members. The Gordon and Marion Smith Foundation for Young Artists has emerged as a complex organization that successfully has addressed its mandate for more than twenty years.

In late 2018 the directors embarked on a plan to streamline the Foundation by reducing staffing commitments and by reviewing Foundation expenditures. Although unknown at the time, this financial restructuring allowed the Foundation to perform efficiently and productively during the COVID-19 years. The combination of reduced expenditures, the continuing support from individual and corporate donors, and a variety of grants received from various organizations enabled the Foundation to maintain its notoriety in the promotion and support for visual arts education. Again in 2022, the Foundation supported hundreds of young people on their journey to learn about and to develop skills in the visual arts. In 2022 the Foundation continued to provide grants to Artist for Kids (AFK) and other initiatives involving school-aged children. Further, the Foundation provided scholarships for students entering post-secondary art education. In fact, in the past twenty years, the Foundation has supported nearly two hundred thousand school-aged children in school programs, after-school and weekend programs, summer camps, and individually.

Gordon Smith, one of Canada's foremost artists, was also a teacher. He envisioned an organization that would encourage and support young people to grow in a world where they had the interest and skills to appreciate visual art. To accomplish this Gordon worked with art teachers and garnered the support of his contemporaries to provide stimulus to establish Artists for Kids. From that beginning the Gordon and Marion Smith Foundation for Young Artists emerged to provide financial support for AFK, and individual students, and to curate art exhibitions in the community.

I would like to thank all those who have continued to support the Foundation financially, as volunteers, or by attending Foundation activities.

# FOR A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

Fundraising is core to Smith Foundation activities. Making sure monies are available to support art education programs in our schools, scholarships for post-secondary students pursuing a visual arts education, the production of exhibitions in the gallery for the general public, and community outreach and audience-building activities drive all of our fundraising strategies. Our donors believe in supporting quality arts education, which can transform lives. Correspondingly, many contribute critical funding year after year.

### Fall Fête

Supporters were invited to join us for an evening of music and celebration featuring the musical stylings of the Mike Allen Quartet along with premiere BC Wines. A framed limited edition print by Gordon Smith, entitled *Savary #2* was available by Silent Auction, and raffle tickets were sold for the chance to win a basket including wines, Smith Foundation publications, and merchandise. In total, \$3,426 was raised.

# Winter 2022

We partnered with Artists for Kids to connect with our community of supporters before the end of 2022 in a direct mail and online appeal. We offered patrons the opportunity to select which programs they directed their funds to, with options including sending a child to AFK's Paradise Valley Summer Camp, supporting the AFK Artist-in-Residence Program, and funding the celebrated Music at the Smith performance series. Donations over \$100 incentivized, as those donors were entered into a draw for a Charlene Vickers limited edition Together, we raised \$7,575.

# **Grants and Scholarships**

The Smith Foundation received \$124,737.35 in annual interest from our Vancouver Foundation-held endowment fund. These monies, couples with annual fundraising efforts, allowed us to grant \$85,000 to Artists for Kids and \$7,500 in scholarships to graduating secondary students in North Vancouver, West Vancouver and Vancouver.

A strong, diverse and increasingly committed source of funding makes the Foundation resilient and able to fulfill its mandate and provide stability of annual programming.

# **OUR SPRING EXHIBITION**

Curated by Kate Henderson

Featuring artists Russna Kaur,

M.E. Sparks and Andrea Taylor

Apr 23 – Jun 25, 2022

Through multisurfaced experiential painting, sculpture, installation, and animation, Russna Kaur, M.E. Sparks, and Andrea Taylor worked to fill in the blanks where words cannot describe the myriad personal, historical, and cultural encounters and occurrences that make up the human experience. In their practices, all three artists share an approach to surface and material, and with their work, each explores the limits and possibilities of their respective mediums.

Through these bodies of work, the artists posed various questions: In what ways can an image be extended, pulled apart, unhinged from its borders, set free? How can mediums with predetermined uses become malleable and unfixed? In what ways are these material concerns a metaphor for how we move through the world as humans—particularly as women?

As a self-published zine, a series of public programs, and as an exhibition, We can only hint at this with words attempted to answer these questions. The exhibited works resisted the boundaries of wall and plinth—they crept, folded, and draped throughout the gallery, becoming unfixed, modular, and ever-evolving. The surface of each artwork served as a skin to tells a story. In this way, these mixed-media objects became living, breathing bodies in the room—entities that we, as viewers, can engage in wordless conversation with.

The artists cull from childhood narratives, cultural traditions, and art historical legacies to create new meanings, thereby inserting their own presences into the folds of history. Through the artists' processes of quoting, redacting, and revising histories—both personal and political—they subvert heteronormative, patriarchal legacies, proposing alternative narratives that pull apart and reject problematic and oppressive histories that have become bound to the female body. The exhibition opened up into other wordless worlds that speak to experiential and radical lines of questioning, bodily freedom, care, and rebellion.
